## **FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS**

For the Third Quarter Ended December 31, 2004 (unaudited)

In the third quarter, the total payment to the Province was \$49.1 million, which was \$2.7 million higher than the prior year due to strong results at the Halifax casino and within the video lottery business line.

The lottery business lines accounted for \$44.2 million of the payment to the Province, which was \$2.4 million higher than the prior year. After a weak year in 2003-04, video lottery continued to perform stronger than anticipated in the third quarter, primarily as a result of game software upgrades which have been made throughout 2004-05.

The Halifax casino payment to the Province was \$4.9 million, \$0.9 million

higher than the prior year due to higher revenues as a result of increased visitation and a well-received fall Stay n' Play promotion.

The Sydney casino payment to the Province was \$1.2 million, \$0.6 million lower than the prior year due to a decline in revenues as a result of decreased visitations and lower levels of play.

Win tax of \$4.2 million was deducted from casino revenues and paid directly to the Province of Nova Scotia during the quarter.

In addition to corporate initiatives aimed at promoting responsible use of its products, Nova Scotia Gaming Corporation also made financial contributions to assist in the treatment and research of problem gambling. The Corporation's responsible gaming budget for 2004-05 is 10% higher than 2003-04. It appears lower in 2004 due to the timing of initiatives. The following highlights the responsible gaming contributions:

## **OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS**

For the Third Quarter Ended December 31, 2004 (unaudited)

The third quarter saw a number of responsible gaming initiatives undertaken and completed. First, the third annual Responsible Gaming Awareness Week (RGAW) successfully ran during the week of October 10-16. The primary objective of the Week was to increase awareness of the importance of playing responsibly among three target groups, namely industry employees, players and the general public. Also, taking place during the same week, was the Know the Score This is a university-based program. gaming awareness program that took place at both Dalhousie and University College of Cape Breton. This event reached more than 2.200 adults between the ages of 19 and 24. Finally, 'Play By Play' was also launched during this guarter. The materials were developed to promote responsible VLT play and include such things as self-assessment tools and budgeting guides. The brochures are available at 450 licensed establishments across the province.

Also in the third quarter, a co-operation agreement between NSGC and Techlink Entertainment was signed to pilot test Techlink's responsible gaming device. This device is based on card-based technology and has the ability to provide responsible gaming features to players. The pilot will begin in March 2005.

То build on the Atlantic Lotterv Corporation's (ALC's) launch of PlaySphere. ALC's online tool for purchasing draw and sports lottery games, ALC has introduced Group Play. Group Play allows members to manage lottery groups online by providing the Group Manager (the person responsible for managing the lottery group) with some

tools that make running a group more convenient. For example, the Group Manager can now more easily track purchases and wins by using an account sheet.

Other highlights during the quarter included the launch of two new Breakopen products. Breakopen's fiftycent Caribbean Cruise ticket offers the opportunity to win one of four Caribbean cruise prizes and East Coast Rocks offers the chance to win a trip for two to the 2004 East Coast Music Awards. Other new product offerings included the introduction of professional tennis and college football betting to Proline sports lottery.

In video lottery, software upgrades on the PowerStation 1 terminals were completed. New games included in this upgrade were Swinging Seals and Goin' Nuts. An upgrade of the VLC games (with new games including Bugsy & Hula Moolah) is scheduled for early in 2005.

During the third quarter, the Halifax casino hosted a number of Christmas-themed concerts. These included shows by Sons of Maxwell on December 16<sup>th</sup> and John Gracie on December 19<sup>th</sup>.

Other events at the casino during the third quarter included a promotion which allowed Player's Club members the chance to win a cruise for two on the Queen Mary 2. This prize was awarded during the quarter to a patron from Chester Basin, Nova Scotia.
