Gaming Revenues

- In 2016-17, gaming provided \$144.6 million to Government to help fund important programs and services.
- In 2016-17, video lottery and ticket lottery retailers earned \$38.1 million in commissions.

• More than 500 people are directly employed by gaming (as of September 2017) representing approximately \$21.7 million in annual salaries and benefits.



*The AGFTD provides licenses to charities for prizes under \$500. The revenue for these are not tracked; however have been estimated to be \$4.6 million in 2016-17

Participation in Gambling

- In 2013, 73% of adults in Nova Scotia reported gambling at least once over the last year. Of these individuals, 93% gambled with no risk of developing problems.¹
- Based on the Canadian Problem Gambling Severity Index, 0.7% of the adult population (about 5,200) in Nova Scotia have problems with their gambling. An additional 1.3% (about 9,600) are considered at moderate-risk of experiencing a problem with gambling.² 4.8% of the adult population is in the lowrisk, category³.
- In 2016-17, Nova Scotians wagered approximately \$1.4 billion on gambling. During this time, \$1.0 billion was paid out in prizes.⁴
